American Dental Association (ADA) in 2010 published the ADA News with an innovative program entitled 'Practice-based Research Networks (PBRNs)', where Dr Craig¹ said, 'Few opportunities exist within the dental profession for private practitioners to have direct impact upon the science base of clinical dentistry.' According to him, many practitioners demonstrated great difference between the conventional practice and the practice with PBRNs. The clinicians must be encouraged to involve in specific studies or clinical trials and also to participate in writing of abstracts and manuscripts. There is a need to sensitize them to publish or present their work so that the peers are benefited worldwide. The aim of research in health sciences is betterment of patients; clinicians are directly involved in patient care and hence no research is complete without their active involvement.
